

HIGH TECH LUNG CANCER SCREENINGS SAVE LIVES

You've got lung cancer - that's a phrase no one wants to hear. But at Grady, more and more these days that phrase is followed by the hopeful news that a cure is possible.

Just over two years ago, Grady became the first hospital in Metro Atlanta to use the Veran Electromagnetic Navigation Platform to biopsy hard to reach and even just barely there nodules in the lungs. Described as a major step forward in the early diagnosis and treatment of lung cancer, Grady's Cancer Center for Excellence is now seeing a major shift in lung cancer stage at the time of diagnosis, as more and more patients are being diagnosed at Stage 1 - the earliest stage of the cancer.

"Being able to confirm a lung cancer diagnosis as a Stage 1 gives patients a better opportunity for curative treatment with surgery or radiation," said Dr. Eric Flenaugh, Chief of Pulmonary & Critical Care Medicine for Morehouse School of Medicine and Director of the Advanced Diagnostic and Interventional Pulmonary Service for Grady. "It's like having GPS of the lung. Prior to this new technology, having a suspicious but small lung nodule (less than 2 cm in diameter) meant surgery, a needle biopsy through (continued on page 2)

GRADY FIRST IN GEORGIA TO GET HIGH TECH LUNG REVOLUTIONARY TECHNOLOGY **FOR BRAIN SURGERY**

Grady will be the first hospital in Georgia to acquire Synaptive Medical's BrightMatter™ technology. This innovative solution provides physicians visualization with unprecedented details of a patient's brain for intervention in situations such as stroke or tumor.

BrightMatter, a seamless integration of essential technologies, is designed to support efficient clinical decision making with advanced imaging, planning, navigation and robotic visualization.

BrightMatter uses a type of MRI called diffusion tensor imaging, or DTI, to produce an image of the entire brain's pathways. This occurs immediately after the MRI is complete and allows physicians to consider every possible approach. In a hospital like Grady where time is of the essence, immediate access to these details can make a significant impact on patients who may be diagnosed with a stroke or brain tumor.

"Grady remains deeply committed to its vision of becoming the leading public academic health care system in the country," said Dr. Gustavo Pradilla, Assistant Professor of Neurosurgery for Emory University Healthcare, and Chief of Neurosurgery for Grady Health System and Co-Director of the Grady Skull Base Surgery Center. "As part of this mission we are excited to announce the acquisition of a revolutionary technology for brain imaging and robotic-assisted neurosurgery."

"This technology brings the most advanced imaging system for neurosurgical planning and allows for minimally invasive surgical treatment of hemorrhages and tumors in deep locations of the brain that were previously deemed inoperable and will transform the way traditional neurosurgical procedures for brain and spine conditions are performed," Pradilla added. "The potential impact for patients is transformative and includes smaller incisions, shorter recovery times, and preservation of vital brain and spinal cord functions."

the chest or two years of regularly scheduled CT scans waiting to see what was happening with that nodule."

Dr. Flenaugh credits outstanding team work for getting patients screened, diagnosed and treated for cancer earlier.

"Our primary care physicians and specialists do a great job of recognizing the risk factors and getting patients screened. As a result, Grady has seen a 5.2% increase in Stage 1 lung cancers and a 4.7% decrease in Stage 4 at the time of diagnosis. Grady's commitment to providing the cutting-edge tools needed to help patients achieve good outcomes means more people will have a chance to win their fight against lung cancer," said Flenaugh.

When the Veran system first came online in 2014, Flenaugh says estimates were that about 60 patients per year would undergo the screening. Last year 570 patients were screened. And this year - Flenaugh says Grady is on track to do more than 900 screenings.

"Not only have our case numbers far exceeded expectations, we now have the ability to successfully biopsy and diagnose cases with a 90.2% accuracy. Our results show we are on target and consistent with national standards," Flenaugh said.

And Grady's success with early diagnosis has not gone unnoticed.

"Grady is a Veran Center of Excellence, which means physicians from around the country and the world have come here to learn how to use this new technology," said Flenaugh. "In addition, I have the pleasure of traveling to other health facilities to help them with start-up."

And while all that's great and Flenaugh is proud of Grady's achievements, he says we must never forget the ultimate goal.

"All of this is about the patient - offering our patients the best care possible. Being able to offer hope when for so long there wasn't any is just wonderful," said Flenaugh. "This new technology enables us to make a real difference in peoples' lives."

STARLIGHT CHILDREN'S FOUNDATION AND NIAGARA CARES SUPPORT PEDIATRIC BURN CENTER

The Grady Health Foundation is proud to announce that it has received a \$100,000 grant from the Starlight Children's Foundation to support needed upgrades to pediatric resources within the Grady Burn Center. The funding was made possible by Niagara Cares, the charitable arm of Niagara Bottling.

Thirty percent of the patients seen by Grady's Burn Center, one of only two verified centers

in the state, are children. The grant will allow the hospital to expand the pediatric outpatient burn clinic and renovate pediatric hydrotherapy treatment equipment.

GRADY CREATING GREEN REVOLVING FUND, INCREASE FOCUS ON SUSTAINABILITY



The Grady Health Foundation has received \$850,000 from The Kendeda Fund that will be matched by the health system to create a Green Revolving Fund (GRF), a financing tool that will invest in sustainability projects such as energy efficiency, water conservation and renewable energy. The GRF projects will produce cost savings that will be reinvested into future sustainability projects as well as direct patient care, improving the Grady community and the hospital's ongoing commitment to the environment.


"We are grateful for the opportunity this new Green Revolving Fund will create for Grady to meet two important goals," said Renay Blumenthal, president of the Grady Health Foundation. "It will allow us to be better stewards of the public and private dollars that are invested into the hospital every year by reducing our operating costs, and it will also allow us to be better stewards of the environment by taking a more sustainable approach to our facilities."

The first project to be completed as a result of this grant will be the replacement of light fixtures throughout the hospital. The fixtures were identified as a high-impact priority through an energy assessment conducted by the Southface Energy Institute in 2015 and funded by a Grants to Green Assessment Award from the Community Foundation for Greater Atlanta.

In addition to creating the Green Revolving Fund, Grady will be joining the Billion Dollar Green Challenge, an initiative by the Sustainable Endowments Institute, to encourage hospitals and other nonprofit organizations in the United States and Canada to invest in self-managed green revolving funds. Through the challenge, Grady will receive support for developing and managing the fund, as well as access to the Green Revolving Investment Tracking System, a web tool to track, manage, and share efficiency data with institutions across North America.

"Grady is one of the first health systems to join our efforts to make a billion-dollar impact on energy efficiency," said Mark Orlowski, Executive Director of the Sustainable Endowments Institute. "We are excited to partner with them and support their work to become a leader within the health care industry and also within the Atlanta community."



"Jenny is such a committed and caring person. I get such positive reports about her work and work ethic," said Krystle Richardson, Community Affairs Manager. "Jenny has been a volunteer here for about two years and we hope she will continue to be part of the Grady family."

"When I was born my mother says she took one look at me and knew something was terribly wrong. She said I looked like a Smurf I was so blue," said Hunter. "I was immediately rushed by doctors for tests to figure out what was wrong. I had a heart valve that wouldn't close - it would pump blood but the blood would not oxygenate."

Hunter says his mother was told that it was a good thing he was born at Grady - If he had been born somewhere else the other hospital would have sent him to Grady, but he probably would not have survived the trip.

"My grandfather still has the video he shot of me in the NICU with a bunch of air lines connected to my body to oxygenate my blood," Hunter said. "The doctors told my parents that the valve could fix itself or that open heart surgery might be needed. Luckily with the right care, it got better on its own."

"My grandfather calls me the miracle baby. I've had an active and healthy life – got my college degree last year and I'm in the process of joining the National Guard. Thanks Grady for making all of this possible."
