

AAMC SITUATIONAL JUDGMENT TEST (SJT): FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. WHY IS MOREHOUSE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE PARTICIPATING IN THE AAMC SJT?

We exist to:

- Improve the health and well-being of individuals and communities
- Increase the diversity of the health professional and scientific workforce
- Address primary health care through programs in education, research, and service

We therefore seek broadly qualified medical students who exhibit capacity for improvement, ethical responsibility to self and others, resilience and adaptability among other pre-professional competencies and are “primarily caring” with a passion for service to underserved communities in urban and rural areas in Georgia, nationally, and globally. It is important for our graduates to be culturally adept and able to deliver high quality and compassionate care for diverse patients. We believe the AAMC SJT exam provides an opportunity to assess these critical pre-professional competencies and may enhance our holistic process.

2. WHY IS MOREHOUSE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE USING THE AAMC SJT INSTEAD OF CASPER?

We felt the AAMC SJT was a good fit for our holistic process because it was designed to measure pre-professional competencies that are critical for success at the MSM and the AAMC has conducted research to establish the psychometric properties and validity of the AAMC SJT.

3. HOW WILL MOREHOUSE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE USE MY SJT SCORES?

We will consider SJT scores as one part of our admissions process.

4. WILL IT NEGATIVELY AFFECT MY APPLICATION/ADMISSIONS EVALUATION IF I DON'T TAKE THE SJT?

No admissions decision will depend solely on the SJT score as it is only one of many metrics we use in evaluating candidates. We require all applicants to take the SJT to ensure we treat each applicant fairly.

5. WILL THE ADMISSIONS COMMITTEE SEE MY SJT SCORES?

Yes, members of the admissions committee will see your SJT scores as one part of our admissions process.

6. I ALREADY GOT INVITED TO COMPLETE A SECONDARY APPLICATION OR AN INTERVIEW, SHOULD I STILL TAKE THE SJT?

Yes, applicants are required to take the AAMC SJT. Doing so will give you an opportunity to display your knowledge of effective and ineffective behaviors across eight core competencies for entering medical students, which include Service Orientation, Social Skills, Cultural Competence, Teamwork, Ethical Responsibility to Self and Others, Reliability and Dependability, Resilience and Adaptability, and Capacity for Improvement.

7. MY APPLICATION WAS REJECTED BY MOREHOUSE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE BEFORE I TOOK THE AAMC SJT. IF I TAKE THE EXAM, WILL MSM RECONSIDER MY APPLICATION?

No, application decisions are final.

8. WILL I HAVE ACCESS TO MY AAMC SJT SCORE AND WILL THERE BE AN INTERPRETATION OF MY RESULTS?

Yes, AAMC SJT scores will be released to examinees in July-October depending on the exam date. A confidence band and percentile rank will also be reported with each total score. Please refer to the AAMC SJT website for more details: www.aamc.org/sjt.

9. WHEN WILL MOREHOUSE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE RECEIVE MY AAMC SJT SCORE?

AAMC SJT scores will be released to examinees and Morehouse School of Medicine in July-October depending on the exam date. Please refer to the AAMC SJT website for more details: www.aamc.org/sjt.

10. WILL OTHER SCHOOLS, NOT PART OF THE 2021 ADMINISTRATION, HAVE ACCESS TO MY AAMC SJT SCORE?

Schools not part of the 2021 administration will not have access to your AAMC SJT scores for the AMCAS 2022 admissions cycle. The AAMC will retain your AAMC SJT score report indefinitely. If you reenter the medical school application process in a future application year, the AAMC will provide your AAMC SJT score report to any program to which you apply that accepts or requires the AAMC SJT exam as part of their application process.

11. WHAT DOES MY SJT SCORE MEAN?

The AAMC SJT results in a total score, which reflects your understanding of pre-professionalism and potential to learn and develop pre-professionalism skills. Higher scores reflect a higher level of understanding.

The AAMC collaborated with medical educators, including faculty, admissions officers, and student and diversity affairs officers to develop the scoring key for the SJT (i.e., the key effectiveness rating for each response). Scores are based on the extent to which your effectiveness rating for each response aligns with medical educators' ratings for each response. Full credit is awarded for an item if your response matches the medical educators' rating. Partial credit is awarded if your rating is close to the medical educators' rating.
